HBAA Editorial: Next Hartford Mayor and City Officials Should Not Ignore the Facts

What a breath of fresh air it would be if our leaders would just say what they really mean and not make the public struggle to interpret their words. Too often there is a spoken agenda the person holding the mic hopes you believe, and then a more accurate but unspoken message – the behind-thescenes agenda - that is intentionally made much less clear to the public. Only the truth however, brings understanding, if the public were allowed to know it.

To illustrate my point, take soon to retire mayor Luke Bronin's July 13th performance at BFJ Planning's public forum, held at Metzner Community Center in Hartford. The purpose of the meeting was to bring interested parties up to date with the ongoing \$ 1.5 mil state funded study to determine "the best and highest use" of the Brainard Airport property, whether to preserve it as an airport or repurpose it for other uses.

Mayor Bronin arrived at the meeting 20 minutes late, shook a few hands, gave a few hugs, smiled for a photograph and then restated his hardened position that the airport doesn't do anything to benefit the city, and the city would be better served by developing additional housing. Then, amid obvious exasperation from the well informed audience, he swiftly exited the meeting without taking a single question or expressing a willingness to debate.

Most will take as a given that Mr. Bronin is a smart guy. Rhodes scholar, Yale & Oxford University graduate, attorney who as mayor of Hartford steered the city out of bankruptcy and through COVID. Credit given where credit is due. But we must also assume he is smart enough to know full well, the facts about Brainard he continues to deny...

The Brainard property regularly floods, as demonstrated just last week with the cresting of the Connecticut River. Global warming data implies that flooding will not be an isolated event in the South Meadow. The dike's protection will not be adequate. The Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) issued a 2018 land study, declaring that the contaminated MIRA and Brainard property is **not safe for residential** housing. Resting between the MIRA plant to the north and MDC waste treatment plant to the south, the area literally stinks – especially in the summer. The cost to taxpayers to rehabilitate the property, were it even possible to do so, would make most of us gasp with disbelief. The adjacent MIRA plant is already a superfund site. Who will choose to live in this area, Mr. Mayor?

We won't speculate what underlies Mr. Bronin's comments or his true agenda, but affordable housing to meet Hartford's demands can't be the true agenda. He is too smart to believe the claims he made at the BFJ Planning meeting. So, though he will soon be replaced by a next mayor who will hopefully provide a more honest message to the public, Bronin's words and stated position will continue to be challenged by those who can legitimately back up their positions with facts, figures, and honest, accurate analysis. The voters always deserve clarity and honesty from their elected leaders. Regrettably, we feel that Mr. Bronin owed it to Hartford residents to have done better.
